Spotlight on Safeguarding: Operation Encompass

Operation Encompass is a police and education early information sharing partnership enabling schools to offer immediate support for children and young people experiencing domestic abuse. Information is shared by the police with a school's trained Key Adult (DSL) prior to the start of the next school day after officers have attended a domestic abuse incident thus enabling appropriate support to be given, dependent upon the needs and wishes of the child.

Children experiencing domestic abuse are negatively impacted by this exposure; domestic abuse has been identified as an Adverse Childhood Experience and can lead to emotional, physical and psychological harm. Operation Encompass aims to mitigate this harm by enabling immediate support, making a child's day better and giving them a better tomorrow.

Operation Encompass directly connects the police with schools to secure better outcomes for children who are subject or witness to police-attended incidents of domestic abuse. Rapid provision of support within the school environment means children are better safeguarded against the short-, medium- and long-term effects of domestic abuse.

Should any of our families need support in this area, then please seek out one of our Designated Safeguarding Leads (DSLs) - we are here to help.

Remember, the DSLs at Paget are Mrs Nussey, Mrs Spiers, Mrs Tomas, Mrs Ewbank and Mr Merriman.

Spotlight on Reading EY & KS1

Dear Parent/Carers

RWI Phonics and Year 2 English

Reading changes everything Teach a child to read and keep that child reading and we will change everything.

And I mean everything.

So how do we teach your child to read at Paget?

Read Write Inc.

We follow the Read Write Inc (RWI) phonics programme which helps <u>all</u>children learn to read fluently and at speed so they can focus on

developing their skills in comprehension, vocabulary and spelling.



Then, in Year 2 we move to using the Literacy Tree scheme, using a range of high-quality texts to help Literacy your child develop fluency and comprehension skills as well as learning spelling rules and developing their English skills.

RWI was developed by Ruth Miskin and more information on this can be found at https://ruthmiskin.com/en/find-out-more/parents/.

How will RWI be taught?

All children are assessed regularly by our RWI lead teachers and are grouped accordingly so that they work with children at the same level. This allows complete participation in lessons and helps your child to grow their confidence and a love of reading.

Reading_

The children learn 44 sounds and the corresponding letters/letter groups using simple picture prompts. They learn to read words using Fred talk and sound blending and the read from a range of storybooks matched to their phonic knowledge. We teach them to work well with partners and develop comprehension skills in stories.

Writing

The children learn to write and form the letters/letter groups which represent the 44 sounds with the help of fun phrases. They learn to write words by using

Fred fingers and we teach them how to build sentences by practising sentences out loud before they write

Talking

The children work in pairs so that they answer questions and they practise every activity with their partner, learning to take turns in talking and reading to each other develop ambitious vocabulary.

What can you do to help? It is important that the children see that you enjoy reading too. Check out our top ten tips for reading with your child.

Ten top tips for reading stories to your child		
1	Make reading to your child feel like a treat. Introduce each new book with excitement.	
2	Make it a special quiet time and cuddle up so both of you can see the book.	
3	Show curiosity in what you're going to read:	
	Oh no! I think Arthur is going to get even angrier now.	
4	Read the whole story the first time through without stopping too much. If you think your child might not understand something, model an explanation:	
	Oh I think what's happening here is that	
5	Chot about the story:	
	I wonder why he did that?	
	Oh no, I hope she's not going to	
	I wouldn't have done that, would you?	
6	Avoid asking questions to test what your child remembers.	
7	Link stories to your own experiences (e.g. This reminds me of)	
8	Read favourite stories over and over again. Get your child to join in with the bits they know.	
9	Read with enthusiasm. Don't be embarrassed to try out different voices. Your child will love it.	
10	Read with enjoyment.	
	If you're not enjoying it, your child won't.	
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Please make sure you are hearing your child read at least 3 x per week and are signing their reading record. Their book bag needs to be in school every day.

SPOTLIGHT ON CURRICULUM: Science



Welcome to a new term of exciting exploration and discovery in our Science classes! Science is an essential part of your child's education, helping them to understand the world around them through curiosity, experimentation, and investigation. Below, we've outlined the key aims of our Science curriculum and ways you can support your child's learning at home.

We aim to provide a range of skills to our pupils throughout this academic year to develop their understanding natural world around them.

This includes:

- Fostering a sense of curiosity: Encouraging children to ask questions about their environment and the natural world.
- Developing scientific knowledge and understanding: Covering key areas such as plants, animals, materials, forces, and the Earth's resources.
- **Building practical skills:** Engaging in hands-on activities that help children design experiments, make observations, and draw conclusions.
- Encouraging scientific thinking: Promoting logical reasoning, problemsolving, and evidence-based conclusions.
- Nurturing an understanding of the environment: Instilling respect and care for the world, including topics on sustainability and conservation.



This term, we will focus on:

Year 1: Animals including humans

Year 2: Living things and their habitats

Year 3: Rocks

Year 4: States of matter

Year 5: Properties and changes of material

Year 6: Light

Through these lessons, children will conduct experiments and deepen their understanding of scientific concepts.

SPOTLIGHT ON CURRICULUM: Science (Continued)

How to Support Your Child's Science Learning at Home

You can play a vital role in your child's scientific development by encouraging them to explore and discover more at home. Here are a few ways to support their learning:

Encourage Curiosity: Ask open-ended questions like "Why do you think this happens?" or "What would happen if...?" This helps children think like scientists.

Hands-On Experiments: Try simple, safe Science experiments at home using household materials. Making a volcano with baking soda and vinegar or testing which objects float in water can be great fun!

Nature Walks: Take your child on nature walks to observe plants, animals, and changes in the seasons. Encourage them to note what they see and ask questions about the environment.

Everyday Science: Science is everywhere! Talk about how things work, such as what makes the kettle boil, why the sky changes colour at sunset, or how plants grow in your garden.

STEM Apps and Websites: There are many educational apps and that can supplement school learning. Try BBC <u>Bitesize</u> or Explorify for engaging Science content.
