



KS1 English and RWI



The Autumn 2 term has got off to a fantastic start with our new RWI groups across Year 2, Year 1 and EYFS. Our aim is to not only help your child to be a fluent reader but also to foster a love of reading.



Year 2 English and whole class reading

We have started the Autumn 2 term exploring 2 new books, and the children are continuing to develop their interest in the world around them and the impact humans can have on animals...

In Whole Class Reading we are learning about lost species.

Spotlight on Reading: EY & KS1 (Continued)

RWI - Year 1 and Reception

This week I have had the opportunity to walk round and see the new RWI groups up and running - the children have been an absolute pleasure to work with. It is great to see them learning their sounds and using them in Fred Talk to help decode and read the words.

How do I know which sounds my child will be learning?

First, your child will learn to read:

- Set 1 Speed Sounds: these are sounds written with one letter:
 m a s d t i n p g o c k u b f e l h r j v
 y w z x and sounds written with two letters
 (your child will call these 'special friends'): sh th ch
 qu ng nk ck
- Words containing these sounds, by sound-blending, e.g. m-a-t mat, c-a-t cat, g-o-t got, f-i-sh fish, s-p-o-t spot, b-e-s-t best, s-p-l-a-sh splash
- Blending Books and Red, Green and Purple Storybooks.

Second, he or she will learn to read:

- Set 2 Speed Sounds: ay ee igh ow oo oo ar or air ir ou oy
- Words containing these sounds
- Pink, Orange and Yellow Storybooks.

Third, he or she will learn to read:

- Set 3 Speed Sounds: ea oi a-e i-e o-e u-e aw are ur er ow ai oa ew ire ear ure
- Words containing these sounds
- · Blue and Grey Storybooks.

Dear Parents and Carers,

Hello and welcome again - bonjour et bienvenue.

This year across key stage 2 we are again developing our love of the French language. Your children will acquire basic skills and understanding of French with a strong emphasis placed on developing their speaking and listening skills, alongside reading and writing. Through experience days and in lessons, the children learn more about the languages spoken within our school and around the world. Our language curriculum in KS2 allows our students to read, write, understand and speak French with increasing confidence as they learn a range of vocabulary and develop a basic understanding of grammar. SPOTLIGHT ON SAFEGUARDING: KNIFE CRIME

THERE ARE MANY REASONS FOR CHILDREN TO DECIDE TO CARRY

<u>A KNIFE OR WEAPON</u> There has been a 78% Increase in Police recorded offences involving a knife or sharp instrument in the last 12 months (upto March 2024)

This list is not exhaustive but gives reasons why children and young people may carry knives:

They fear being a victim of knife crime – this could be from a specific threat, or a perceived fear, and are carrying the knife for protection. This is the most common reason that young people give us for knife carrying

General self defence – the 'just in case' reason.

They may feel marginalised or alienated.

Peer pressure or being pressured into carrying it for someone else.

They don't know it's wrong or they don't know it's illegal.


To intimidate others (by way of protection)

To earn respect or street cred.

THE CURRENT PICTURE IN THE WEST MIDLANDS:

THE WEST MIDLANDS POLICE AREA HAS THE HIGHEST RATE OF
KNIFE CRIME OFFENCES IN ENGLAND & WALES, LATEST
NATIONAL FIGURES SHOW.



According to ONS data, there have been **5,324 knife crime offences** dealt with by the force in 2023, released for the period between December 2022 and the end of December 2023. The map above is for 2019, demonstrating that knife crime continues to be a concern for us all.



TOGETHER WE MUST...

It can take just 30 seconds to fatally stab someone. Just 30 seconds to change many lives. Why let it change yours?

It is a misconception that knife crime is a gang issue.

While many young people don't carry knives, as parents you have a role to play in helping your child make the right choice on this subject. If there is one person your child will listen to, it's you. They respect you more than you think.

Many comments showed how pleased you are that your child is in our school, how happy you are with the teaching staff and how happy your child is at school. The analysis showed that 99% of children are happy at our school, 99% feel safe and 97% of parents and carers would recommend our school to another parent.

Your communication with us is important. Where disagree or strongly disagree has been ticked, I will be contacting you, for you to have an opportunity to meet with me or the class teacher to discuss your concerns.

Throughout the year, please do let us know how you feel about your child attending our school and we want to work with you to keep improving our school.




